This statement on principal adverse impacts on sustainability factors covers the reference period from 1 July to 31 December 2022.

The Product until 31/12/2022 invested its assets into the underlying fund - Lyxor MSCI World Climate Change (DR) UCITS ETF (ISIN: LU2056739464). Once Lyxor shared the information that the ETF does not have sustainable investment object, INVL Life investment management team have put best efforts to reinvest. From the 2023 January the Product invested assets in Swisscanto (Lu) Sustainable Equity Fund which has sustainable investment objective.

Description of the principal adverse impacts on sustainability factors

The Product until 31/12/2022 invested its assets into the underlying fund - Lyxor MSCI World Climate Change (DR) UCITS ETF, ISIN: LU2056739464. The principal adverse impacts on sustainability factors of Lyxor ETF managed by Amundi are explained here:

The indicators for adverse impacts have been taken into account as do not significant harm (DNSH) filter is applied by the Amundi.

The first DNSH filter relies on monitoring of mandatory Principal Adverse Impacts indicators in Annex 1, Table 1 of the Delegated Regulation (EU) 2022/1288 where robust data is available via the combination of following indicators and specific thresholds or rules:

- Have a CO2 intensity which does not belong to the last decile compared to other companies within its sector (only applies to high intensity sectors), and
- Have a Board of Directors' diversity which does not belong to the last decile compared to other companies within its sector, and
- Be cleared of any controversy in relation to work conditions and human rights, and
- Be cleared of any controversy in relation to biodiversity and pollution.

Amundi already considers specific Principle Adverse Impacts within its exclusion policy as part of Amundi's Responsible Investment Policy. These exclusions, which apply on the top of the tests detailed above, cover the following topics: exclusions on controversial weapons, Violations of UN Global Compact principles, coal, and tobacco.

The Product did not have separate policies to identify and prioritise principal adverse impacts on sustainability factors.

Description of policies to identify and prioritise principal adverse impacts on sustainability factors

The Product incorporation of ESG factors in its investment appraisal, due diligence and decision-making processes identifies principal adverse impacts on relevant sustainability factors.

The Product considers principal adverse impacts ("PAIs") of investment decisions on sustainability factors, these contribute to measuring the attainment of the sustainable investment objective and partly as a form of risk avoidance. The Product monitors on the mandatory indicators.

The Product until 31/12/2022 invested its assets into the underlying fund – Lyxor MSCI World Climate Change (DR) UCITS ETF (ISIN: LU2056739464). Amundi is the investment manager of Lyxor ETF. The ETF in which the Product invested its assets considered principal adverse impacts on sustainability factors in this way:

The ETF considers all the mandatory Principal Adverse Impacts applying to the product's strategy and relies on a combination of exclusion policies (normative and sectorial), engagement and voting approaches:

- Exclusion: Amundi has defined normative, activity-based, and sector-based exclusion rules covering some of the key adverse sustainability indicators listed by the Disclosure Regulation.
- Engagement: Engagement is a continuous and purpose driven process aimed at influencing the activities or behaviour of investee companies. The aim of engagement activities can fall into two categories: to engage an issuer to improve the way it integrates the environmental and social dimension, to engage an issuer to improve its impact on environmental, social, and human rights-related or other sustainability matters that are material to society and the global economy.
- Vote: Amundi's voting policy responds to a holistic analysis of all the long-term issues that may influence value creation, including material ESG issues. For more information, please refer to Amundi's Voting Policy.
- Controversies monitoring: Amundi has developed a controversy tracking system that relies on three external data providers to systematically track controversies and their level of severity. This quantitative approach is then enriched with an in-depth assessment of each severe controversy, led by ESG analysts and the periodic review of its evolution. This approach applies to all of Amundi's funds.

Engagement policies

INVL Life, as a portfolio manager of the Product, has an approved Engagement Policy, however, because of the fact that the Product invests its assets in external fund, conerns such as shareholder voting and setting reporting standards for direct managers of investments are not precisely relevant to the Product. Hovewer, the Life investment management team try to get information from the managers of the external fund for their own investment and stewardship efforts.

References to international standards

The OECD Guidelines for Multinational Enterprises and the UN Guiding Principles on Business and Human Rights are integrated into ESG scoring methodology. Lyxor ETF managed by Amundi proprietary ESG rating tool assesses issuers using available data from our data providers. For example, the model has a dedicated criteria called "Community Involvement & Human Rights" which is applied to all sectors in addition to other human rights linked criteria including socially responsible supply chains, working conditions, and labour relations. Furthermore, controversy monitoring on a, at minimum, quarterly basis is conducted which includes companies identified for human rights violations. When controversies arise, analysts evaluate the situation and apply a score to the controversy (using proprietary scoring methodology) and determine the best course of action. Controversy scores are updated quarterly to track the trend and remediation efforts.

Historical comparison

2022 is the first reporting period for the financial product and therefore a historical comparison cannot be made.
